

The Wheatland Town Council held their regular meeting on May 9 in the Council Chambers. Vouchers in the amount of \$746,316.87. were approved for payment. The next meeting will be June 13 in Council Chambers beginning at 7:00 p.m.

“Poppy Day” will be **May 28th** as declared by a proclamation presented by the American Legion Auxiliary. Everyone is encouraged to buy a poppy in remembrance of those who gave the ultimate sacrifice.

Thinking of running for a seat on the Town Council? Two positions will be open at the end of the year. **May 27th** is the last day to file. Forms can be picked up at Town Hall.

Mayor Fabian noted that Rhonda Apodaca has been appointed to fill a position on the Planning & Zoning Commission due to the resignation of Dan Brecht. Dan was thanked for his exemplary service to the community. Rhonda’s appointment was approved unanimously.

Tom Bramlet presented the Lion’s Club project that will add an additional 9-holes to the Frisbee golf course at Lewis Park. The town unanimously agreed to support the project in the amount of \$1,000.

Many citizens were on hand to discuss their concerns about feral cats that roam the streets. This issue will be discussed in more detail at an upcoming workshop, but in the meantime the building inspector will contact homeowners and ask them to seal up holes in foundations and vacant buildings.

Ordinance No. 796, as it applies to deposits required for utility services, was presented for third and final reading. The ordinance was approved on third and final reading. A copy of the ordinance can be found at www.townofwheatlandwy.org, or by contacting the office.

Ordinance No. 800, as it applies to the franchise agreement for Vyve Cable was presented for third and final reading. The ordinance passed unanimously.

Ordinance 801, as it applies to the continuance of the optional 1% sales tax, was presented for second reading and was accepted unanimously. Third and final reading will be in June.

Ordinance 802, as it applies to the rezone of property in the 700 block of E. Cole Street, was presented for second reading and was accepted unanimously. Third and final reading will be in June.

Ordinances 803, 804 and 805 were presented for first reading and will move forward for second reading in June. Complete copies of ordinances can be found at Town Hall and/or online at www.townofwheatlandwy.org.

In other business a catering permit was approved for Vimbo’s Dusty Boots. The council also approved a contract with TDS Waste Management Services, and an MOU for the Town/County Planner was also approved.

Five Wheatland Middle Schools will be competing at Nationals on the University of Maryland Campus in June. The students receive no school funding for their trip to the national competition it was



agreed to provide \$1,000 toward their costs.

Congratulations to all of Wheatland seniors as they graduate from high school and begin their new adventures. Al-



so to **Mayor Fabian** who recently graduated from Golden Gate Seminary with a Masters Degree in Theology.

Wheatland's solid waste transfer station is opening soon. Public meetings will be held in June to share information about the new hours, methods of payments, what will and will not be accepted, etc. **Pete Delgado**, site manager, will be available to answer questions about the new facility.

At this time it is anticipated that the new facility will be open Monday-Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and on Saturday from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Payment can be in the form of cash, checks, credit and/or debit cards. Charge accounts can also be set up. Once the new facility is open the Town of Wheatland will NOT accept shingles, concrete, asphalt, ashes, or construction debris. Latex paint will also NOT be accepted unless it is solidified. Recycling will be accepted in the form of paper/magazines, cardboard, plastic, aluminum cans, glass and metal. Appropriately identified containers will be available. The station will also accept appliances such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditions, etc. Freon has to be removed by a certified licensed repairman or an additional fee will be imposed. There will be seven green waste containers at different locations around town for grass clippings, leaves and small tree branches.
